

Fly Fishing the Spectacular San Juan with Larry Johnson



Not too far from southern California is a river that is world famous . . . world famous, that is, among fly fishers. In the northwest corner of New Mexico is where the San Juan River flows out of Navajo Dam, and there are very few fly fishing waters that can compete with this stream for numbers, size or the strength and fighting abilities of these trout.

The San Juan is a tributary of the Colorado River and became famous as a trout fishery after the Navajo Dam was built, which made the San Juan a tailwater. Construction began on this earthen dam in 1957 and was completed in 1962, originally designed for water storage in the newly created Navajo Lake. It is 402 feet high and more than 3,600 feet in length. Before the dam, the river was a relatively small one in the arid western foothills of the Rocky Mountains with not much to attract hordes of fly fishers.



But after the dam was in operation, with water flowing at a constant temperature of 42 to 44 degrees year-round, and the initial stocking of brown trout, the world began to take notice and for good reason. The trout average 17 to 19 inches, with many much larger. The fish took to the San Juan perfectly and the stocking of browns actually stopped 25 to 30 years ago so the browns are now considered wild. (These days some rainbows are stocked.) The pristine water below the dam runs for about 20 miles, with the fish numbering an incredible nine to twelve thousand per mile. This desert setting is indeed a unique one for a trout fishery, with the fish of the San Juan holding in pods, scattered in many of the riffles, as well as in back channels. The

primary food source is midges, with the trout also taking mayflies, blue-wing olives, caddis, stoneflies, terrestrials like hoppers and ants and more meaty food such as worms, (yes, where did you think the San Juan worm got its name), leeches, snails and scuds.

You can drive to the river, or you can fly into Albuquerque, which then leaves you a little more than a three hour drive to the northwest, or you can fly into Durango, Colorado, which is one hour north of the river.



Larry Johnson has been fishing the San Juan for years. He loved it when he first fished it in the mid-80s and that love has steadily increased during the last 14 years that he's been living on the banks of the river. The southwest was a new experience for Larry. He was born and raised in New Jersey where his family had a restaurant along the shore of Lake Lackawanna – yes there is a Lake Lackawanna — that has been a summer resort 50 miles outside of New York City since 1911. Larry is one of five children born to a man whose first job was a mathematician working on what would become a new invention — called a computer — for IBM. Then Larry's father went off to fight in World War II.

Larry learned to fish from a neighbor at the lake, a Catholic priest whom Larry describes as being a family friend and a good fishing teacher who was the person to first put a bamboo rod in Larry's hand. Larry describes Fa-

ther John Dericks as a man his family loved so much that he married everyone in the family . . . and they weren't even Catholic.

Larry graduated from Nichols College of Business in Dudley, Massachusetts in 1975 with degrees in business administration and marketing. After graduating, he worked at a ski lodge in Vermont until his brother-in-law convinced him to come out west to California. After a few years of working in different sales positions, Larry was hired by Polaroid where he spent more than a decade working for that corporation in Europe. In 1991 he was on a fishing trip in Florida where he had dinner with a doctor when this doctor showed him a new-fangled invention — a digital camera. Larry is a smart man and almost immediately realized that the Polaroid camera was doomed. He took early retirement and eventually wound up in New Mexico where, in 2000, he decided to become something of a trout bum on the San Juan. He actually took a job working behind the counter in a fly shop and, a year later, when Soaring Eagle Lodge came on the market, he bought it. He lived through some rough spots, like the actual day he took possession of the lodge. It was September 11, 2001 and by early afternoon, he was flooded with cancellations. But his skills at sales, marketing and publicity have proven invaluable and his investment paid off. He loves the San Juan, he loves guiding on the San Juan and he loves all the people who come there to fish.

The award follows a similar EAS award last year for work on nearby Silver Creek, and it continues a collaboration of organizations to extend the recovery habitat of Lahontan cutthroat trout. We will be working as volunteers with paid biologist interns in preserving the habitat for Lahontans. For the interns it is a useful career step; for the volunteers who enjoy camping and hiking it is a refreshing break from the routine and an education in the recovery process; for the trout it is life and death. GSF and the South West Council International Federation of Fly Fishers (SWCIFFF) will be signing up volunteers to assist the interns. # **Conservation Report**

#### HELP WITH NATIVE LAHONTAN CUTTHROAT TROUT RECOVERY IN THE WEST WALKER BASIN

Volunteers are needed from Trout Unlimited to assist the California Department of Fish and Wildlife inn recovering the native Lahontan cutthroat trout in Eastern Sierra streams. The Lahontans were all but eliminated from their habitat by illegally planted brook trout in Silver Creek and Slinkard Creek in the West Walker basin.

This is a great opportunity to give back to the eastern Sierras for all the wonderful fishing experiences they provide. This year could be extremely tough on fish, so let's give them a hand by removing a stressor (non-native fish), something we can do with immediate beneficial impacts. **WHEN:** Volunteers are needed for FOUR DAY shifts starting on Thursdays and ending on Sundays with shifts available from early July to September. The schedule is as follows:

#### WHERE:

**SLINKARD CREEK:** The Slinkard Creek site is 50 minutes north of Bridgeport, CA, on highway 89, followed by a drive along a rough road for two to three miles. Access to the creek is generally less than a mile but over challenging terrain. Expect to camp near the work site, though each person is free to do otherwise.

**SILVER CREEK:** The Silver Creek site is located 23 minutes north of Bridgeport, CA, on highway 108. Silver Creek runs through the US Marine's Mountain Warfare Training Base on Hwy 108 (Sonora Junction). There is a road

through the base to a parking area where we hike in app. 2 miles of easy terrain. The elevation is in the 9,000 ft range. Volunteers camp near the work site or trail head.


**WHAT:** Volunteers will assist interns that will be electroshocking the water that temporarily stuns the brook and Lahontan trout. The brook trout are removed from the water and killed while the Lahontans are returned. Volunteers will be netting the stunned fish, caring for the Lahontans, and removing stream side vegetation. At the Slinkard Creek site volunteers will be primarily tasked with brush clearance and path creation for the team of electro-shockers. Volunteer experience with hand and power tools will be particularly valuable.

**FACILITIES:** Expect primitive camping near the work site. Volunteers will need their own camping materials and food.

## Fly of the Month

### **Balance Bug - Greenie**

This is a combination of one of my favorite still water flies "Greenie" and the balance bug tying method. The Greenie was designed by Dan Seitz who was a fellow Nationals and America Cup teammate. Greenies have worked on stocked fish and wild fish in every still water I have ever fished.

The balance bug Method allows for the fly to "hang" level when fished under a bobber or using advanced still water techniques. These flies sink at a 45 deg angle and look like a fish slowly swimming down towards the bottom. Fish hit these really hard, especially after some added movement with short or long strips.

#### **Materials**

**Hook:** Syndicate 400BK Size 12 (Available at The Fly Stop)

Extender: Dressmaker pins, Size 20

Bead: 3.3 mm Countersunk Fluro Green or Chartreuse Tungsten Bead

Thread: Veevus Black 8/0

Tail: Black Marabou

**Body:** Hareline Dubbin UV Ice Dub Black

Rib: Waspi Palmer Chenille Black

Step I: Place Bead onto Dress maker pin




Step 2: Cut dressmaker pin to about 1/3 its original length with a pair of Dykes.



**Step 3:** Put hook into vice and start thread base about I/3 down hook shank. (I messed up and started with green thread. I change later to the required black thread)



**Step 4:** Tie pin and bead onto top of shank. This can be difficult to get it to stay on top.



Step 5: Whip Finish



**Step 6:** Remove hook from vice and test to see if it "balances". If it doesn't balance (like shown) push the pin back until it does.





Step 7: Wrap thread to back. Be careful around pin cut. It is sharp and will cut your thread.



Step 8: Tie in Marabou tail.



Step 9: Tie Palmer Chenille in at the back. Thread to remain towards back of fly.



**Step 10:** Dub the body with UV Ice dubbing. This will be picked out later, so a heavier than usual dubbing is OK.



**Step II:** Wrap Palmer Chenille forward. Looking for about 4-5 wraps. Same amount as a rib on a typical bugger. You do not want touching turns. Sweep the fibers towards the back as you wrap forward.



**Step 12:** Wrap up to bead (past eye of the hook) and provide (2) four turn whip finishes.



**Step 13:** Test the fly to confirm balance is acceptable. (The fly is level)


